(Wasco Aim. July 7-1918.)

## PAIUTE--WASCO IITDIAN TRIBAI WARFARL.

I went on the path to fight the paiutes often when a young man.
The Paiutes were bad people, but they were great fighters. Chiefs' Yov-we-wap, Pile-nee, Oeits, Chac-tat, were eood fighters anong the Paiutes. It was denger on the trail when fighting the Paiutes. Taybe you starve one week, two weeks. Waybe you eat leaves, grass or any thing Oreest \#' 1. you find. any thing to eat helps a little bit. Fight all over, night and day. Track Paiute in snow. See only one track, track of one man, but maybe three hundred paiutes have gone on that trail. All step in .bio Ve scout and track Paiutes to bad same track, looks like only one passed. Brbbbabkbbhbbbbbat place, rocks or canyon. They have no fire/a/ph\& यh in evening time. Before daylight they build fire out of sage brush, maybe eat some grasshoppers, ther they dance. fofter dancing, they go away again and hide before it is daylight, paintes sly like, coyote, but he fights like wolf.

Jradrose chiefs I give you name of, Paiute chiefs, you could not hit them with bullet or arrov. They come up little ways when fighting and shot go like rain-bullets and arrovs go like wind. Mone can hit them. I do not know. I was that way mgself. Ione coula hit me. When a boy Indian go out in the mountains or wild place and do not eat for one week, maybe. He aoes not get laży. He gets strong and brave. Maybe he becomes a doctor(medicine man), a hunter or a varrior.

Payutes had 'bows and arrows, no guns. We fight them and get boys and girls for slaves. We treat them good, feed them, clothe them, but they must work and do things for us. Bye and bye they like us, maybe marry and become one of us, same as Wasco Injun. Some times we sell them to the Yakimas for slaves. Good one worth six or seven horses, or a nice canoe. Ve like canoe better than horses. Yakimas not much fighters. Mez Perce not much fighters. All like old woman. Adur 3,

We do not scalp women and girls, only scalp men and boys. Ve
put scalps on string and hang on rocks for people to see in our village. One Nasco fellow went to get Injun cherries. He was a good strong man, nothing scare him. One Paiute man sat on rocks. I see him. He has long hair, no clothes on. That Paiute sees the pasco eating Vasco po
cherries. स re thought: "Maybe my friend eat cherries".
Pasco aim at Paiute. Paiute jura over rocks and get away. Then lots Paiutes come. They shoot Wasco all over with arrows. They scalp him and take him to supert (?) Creek and put him in creek. Wasco had spirit of Steelhead qhíh/ salmon. Steelhead has white head when old. The pasco now had white head, no hair, all scalped. Steelhead said to the Wasco man lying in the water:
"You see me? Look at my head! Your head is same way! You will not die: You will live.

The man got out of water and went home.
That night the Mascon fiddled ${ }^{2 l l}$ night, fixing to go to war. The wood is two sticks about three feet long and fixed good for song. We fit to Hot springs, sixty or seventy people, all for war. We travel all night to the mountains. We hide in day time. That night we see big light, big fire. We hear yelling and song. We get closer. Yes: there are the paiutes. They have the $7 \phi$ he hair of the Wasco on a long stick, waving it and dancing. All are yelling, big time. But the Vasco was not dead. He was living that very time.

The Paiutes stop dancing at daylight. Io body is following them. They are safe. Then we go all around them on belly--go easy and still like snake. We are all around their camp. One Snake Injun stands up with bow and arrows. He sings. He knows we are there, but he is not afraid. That is way of Paiute Injun. He is brave. I shot that Paiute, shot him myself. He fell and the others jump up. Then shooting all around, every where bullets and arrows. We have guns, Paiutes only bows and arrows. We fight hard, Wasco and Paiutes. The sun comes up. We fight
on, hiding behind rocks and trees-any where we hide. About ten oclock we stop. Some of the Paiutes get away--went to Shetike, their own place, where the grass houses were. We xilled six of the Snake Injuns. We scalped them-took all the hafr-and then came back home. I scalped the Snake I killed. Fe got bows and arrows and many things they left on that fight-fixe
 Paiute hair. Next day all the people came, Vomen and all. Bigy drum and dance with hair on sticks. It was a big time. We had whipped the Paiutes, the Snake Injuns. Three of our men got shot with arrows but all got woll. cox-stocks, [head] was the man who was scalped. He lived. He painted his head red. He had a good strong spirit, he did not die. The Paiute I shot stood up and sang. He was good looking. He knew we were there. Then I shot, he sprang high and fell dead. Payute and Wesco do not holler when going to be shot.

When I joined the Shakers I gave away two gunny sacks of Indian clothing and trinkets. I gave Kolwash \& seven plaits of Paiute hair, fast *ot qo atroowear acrossm
to a string to wearmexnss the breast, from shoulãer to waist. It was

buried with Kolwash when he died. I had a necklace of grizzly bear-claws which I gave ava. It was buried with the man I gave it to. I got the. . necklace from the Klamath Injuns. I never found any grizzly when hunting.








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
